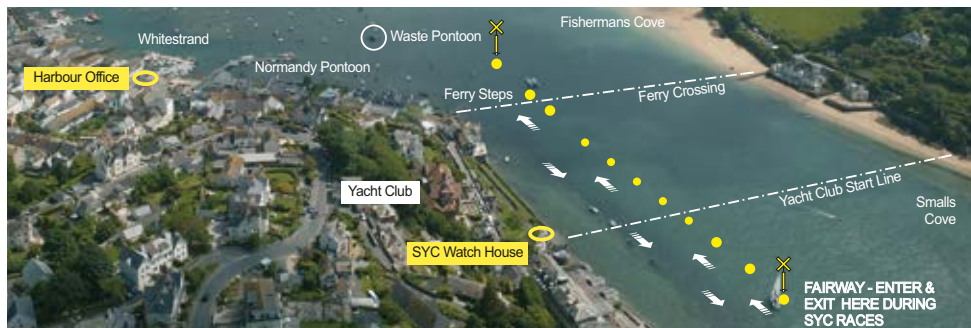

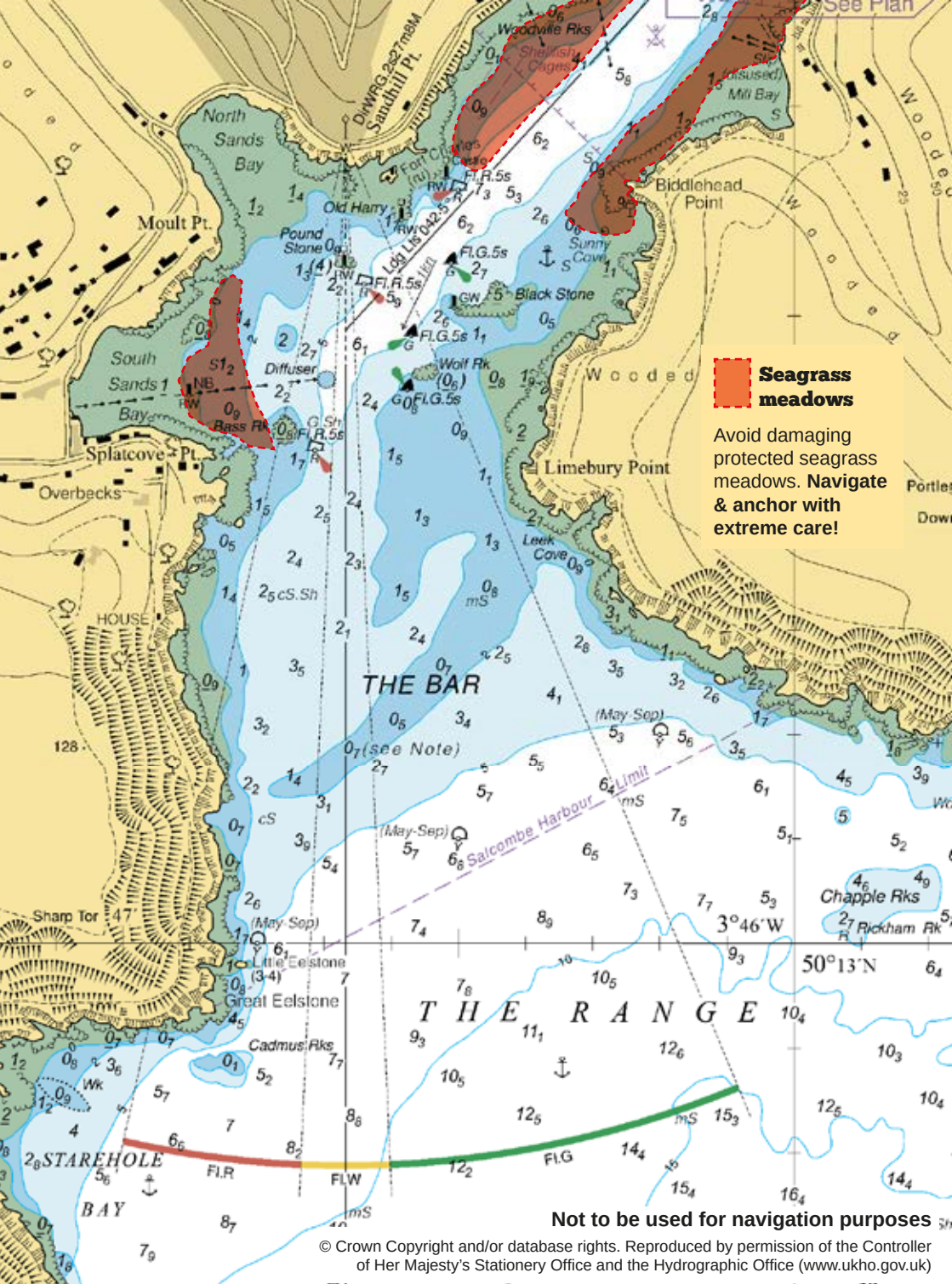
The harbour lies between Bolt Head to the west and Prawle Point to the east. Salcombe's Bar, made famous in Tennyson's "Crossing of the Bar", stretches south westerly across the entrance from Limebury Point on the east side. This sand bar has a least depth of 0.5 metres LAT and should not be negotiated on an ebb tide with strong onshore winds or swell. The entrance leading line (000°T) is marked by a red and white striped pole with red topmark on the Poundstone Rock, with a second beacon behind it on Sandhill Point, which is white with a horizontally striped red and white diamond topmark. The rear beacon displays a Directional Flashing light WRG.2s, of which the white sector 357°-002°T shows the leading line. Once Blackstone Rock is abeam to starboard, the main fairway course of 042°T can be set, marked by transit lights near to Scoble Point. The navigable channel through the turn from 000 T to 045 T is marked by six lateral buoys. Three port hand buoys at Bass Rock, Poundstone and Castle with FL.R.5s lights and three starboard hand buoys at Wolf Rock, Blackstone South and Blackstone North with FL.G.5s lights.

Racing Dinghy Free Fairway

During a dinghy race start sequence a boatlane/racing dinghy free fairway will be established between Millbay/Woodville Rocks and the East Portlemouth Ferry crossing. This is denoted by a line of yellow buoys on the town side of the channel with a yellow cross at either end and is active when the SYC Watch House displays yellow flashing lights. All non-racing traffic is requested to proceed within this lane maintaining a good look out.

This is a 6 KNOT ZONE - please keep wake to a minimum.

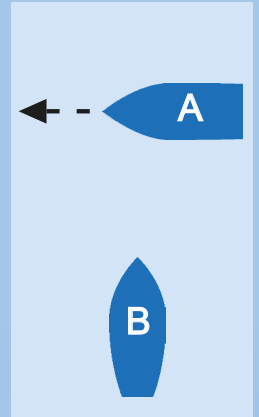
Within the confined spaces of the Estuary, safety for all our water users is paramount. Please refer to the "Rules of the Road" details below when using your boat in close proximity to other boats.



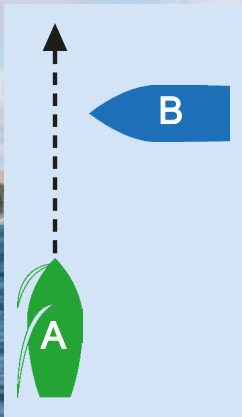

B gives way, different tacks. Vessel on port tack gives way.



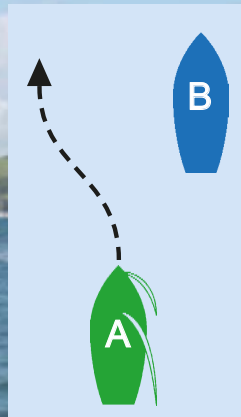

Motor vessels alter course to starboard.



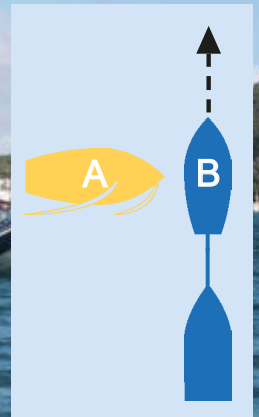

Tips to keep your boating trip safe

Over the past year, our log books of everyday incidents have been analysed and used as part of our safety management system to identify key areas of concern. This leads us to, where possible, help educate harbour users to try to improve safety and, in turn, reduce the likelihood or severity of these incidents.



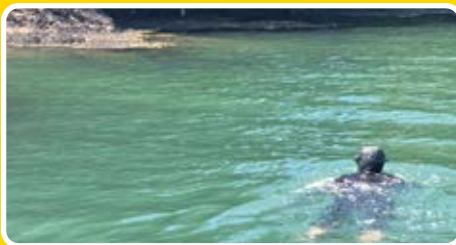
STRONG TIDES

A number of collisions, resulting in significant damage, expense, and concern appear to be partly attributed to a boat's helm not taking into account strong tidal flow when manoeuvring, especially the extra speed and leeway gained when heading down-tide.



HARBOUR DUES AND IDENTIFICATION

Kayaks, SUP's and other small craft used to navigate around the harbour require registration and Harbour Dues. Please ensure they are identifiable (by their sticker) so we can reunite lost vessels with their owner and confirm that the owner is safe and not a 'Man Over Board!'



SWIMMING

Swimming across the harbour channels is prohibited for your own safety. We welcome swimming in the vicinity of the beaches/shoreline, where this is not directly into a busy fairway of boating traffic. Please be aware that, at a glance, your head may only look like a mooring buoy!



DAMAGE

A large amount of damage can result from not mooring your boat in the correct way. **Covering your propeller** whilst berthed, however, can help prevent damage to your vessel and others where boats are berthed on, or manoeuvring around, high density pontoon facilities.

Towing your trailer safely

Please ensure your vehicle is capable of towing the laden / wet weight of your boat and ALL of the below are in place on the road and the slipway.

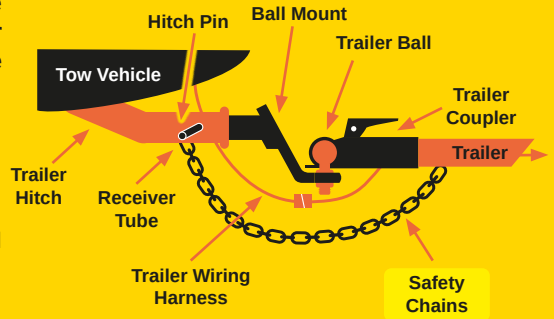
TOW BALL AND CONNECTIONS

Check that:

- the trailer is correctly coupled to the towball or pin - follow the manufacturer's advice
- the coupling height is correct
- the 7 or 13 core cable and plug is not damaged

BREAKAWAY CABLE / SAFETY CHAIN

Use a breakaway cable or secondary coupling. This engages the trailer's brakes (if fitted) or stops the trailer if it becomes detached from the car.



Check that:

- the cable is not worn or damaged
- there's enough slack in the cable so that it does not accidentally apply the brakes
- the cable will not drag on the ground when you're driving

How to moor your boat

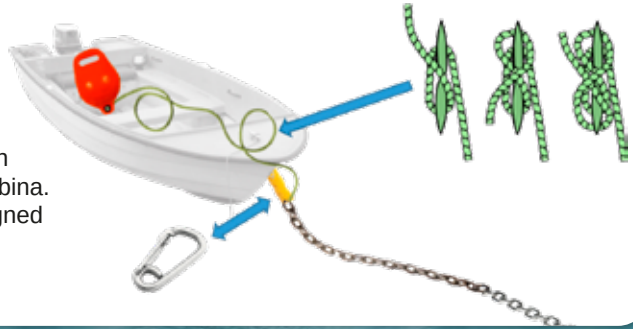
All moorings require you to fix your boat to the chain or buoy making a primary attachment with you own equipment, indicated by the yellow lines.



S.H.A. mooring configuration must not be altered but may be added to with your own equipment being mindful this does not increase the scope of the mooring.

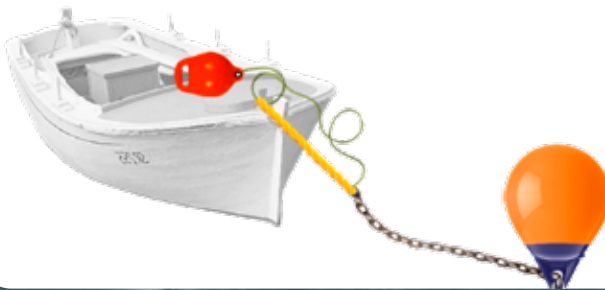
Foreshore (drying) mooring

Pick up hand/pick up buoy and cleat off aboard lifting rope to secure boat to chain with your own warp or karabina. The length of chain is designed to be raised to the waters surface to attach to.



Dan buoy mooring

Pick up hand/pick up buoy and cleat off aboard lifting rope to secure boat to chain with your own warp or karabina as per foreshore mooring.



Deepwater mooring

Connect your own warps/chain to the shackle/eye/swivel on top of the mooring buoy.

Shackles and thimbles will help reduce wear on ropes when attaching to the buoy.

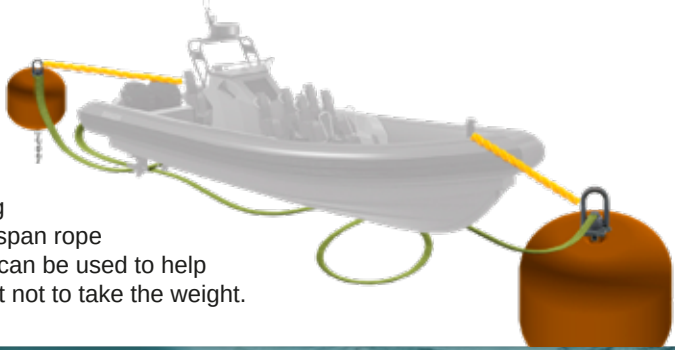
NB: All swinging moorings have a swivel as part of their construction.





Fore and aft mooring

Connect your own warps to both bow and stern points from securing buoys aboard. The span rope between the buoys can be used to help position the boat but not to take the weight.

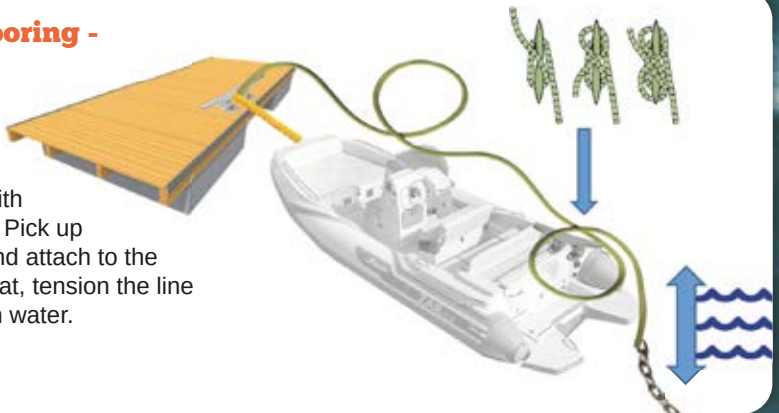


Pontoon mooring - alongside

Connect your boat to the pontoon cleats with your own warps. A bow and stern line will hold the boat into the pontoon whilst spring lines will prevent the boat moving forward or backward.

Pontoon mooring - stern line

Connect your boat to the pontoon cleat from the bow with your own warp. Pick up the stern line and attach to the back of your boat, tension the line to allow for high water.



Marine Security

Reporting incidents to the police

If you are the victim of boat theft, call the police immediately on 101. Check to make sure that your boat is still seaworthy and hasn't been badly damaged. And, if you can, check that neighbouring boats haven't been broken into as well.

If your call is an emergency, i.e. a threat to life, or if a crime is in progress, call 999 immediately.

Make sure you take as much information as possible, such as serial numbers, when reporting a crime.

Boat Watch

This is a community scheme. It operates in the same way as a Neighbourhood Watch scheme. The scheme is run by the community, for the community, and is supported by a number of agencies such as the police, fire service and local councils.

Boat Watch is linked locally, to the National Maritime Project Kraken, which delivers enhanced counter-terrorism vigilance with the aim of increasing public safety. Contact details for

Security checklist:

- ✓ Don't leave anything loose in the cockpit or on the deck
- ✓ Always put your valuables in a strong, fixed locker and secure with a quality deadlock or padlock
- ✓ Take your personal and vessel papers with you – don't leave them on board
- ✓ Don't leave your home address on show
- ✓ Don't leave your keys in the ignition – always take them with you
- ✓ Keep your boat keys separate from your engine keys
- ✓ Make sure your curtains are closed so no-one can look in
- ✓ Ensure all unused ropes, fenders and other items are out of sight in your cockpit lockers and cupboards
- ✓ Make sure that your life raft and outboard motor are secure, as these are valuable and attractive to boat thieves
- ✓ If you're leaving your boat on a trailer for the winter consider putting it on blocks
- ✓ Keep your list of serial numbers up to date
- ✓ Take pictures of your property so that it can be easily identified if recovered.

Visitors Mooring Information

Visitors from sea

Swinging moorings are available off the town between Mill Bay and the Fuel Barge. Visitors' buoys are marked with a "V" and state maximum length, up to 9m on orange buoys, over 9m on yellow buoys. A large visitors' pontoon with yellow pile caps is also available in "The Bag" to the north west of Scoble Point, offering good shelter from prevailing weather conditions. Anchorages adjacent to town include off Town/Fishermans Beach and Smalls Cove (avoiding the Yacht Club racing start line when appropriate). An anchorage further from town is available north of "The Bag" where the residents moorings finish, in the vicinity of the Saltstone. Anchoring is prohibited in the middle of fairways and near to ferry or cable crossings. Overnight walk-ashore berths are bookable at Whitestrand pontoon outside commercial hours, generally for 2 vessels between 1900 and 0800, draught/tide dependant.

Short stays alongside Normandy pontoon (eastern side) in the entrance to Batson Creek are available for water and provisions but are restricted to half an hour at busy times. The shoreside (western side) of Normandy Pontoon provides tender berthing for up to 3.65m LOA.

Customs

If you are leaving or entering the UK on a pleasure boat of any kind, you are required to submit a pleasure craft report. Visit spcr.homeoffice.gov.uk and complete the simple, one-stop digital form up to 24 hours before you depart. Yachtline 033 123 2012.

Animals

Vessels from foreign ports with animals on board which have not entered the country at a designated port via a recognised route or carrier are not permitted to berth alongside the quays or land the animals.

Visitors from land

Drying-out mud moorings suitable for craft up to a maximum of 6 metres overall may be booked by the week from the Harbour Office, Whitestrand, Salcombe. Tel: 01548 843791

Moorings are also available from other private boatyards.

Kingsbridge - a harbour within a harbour

If your draft is less than 2 metres, your LOA is less than 11 metres and you are prepared to take the ground, why not visit the busy market town of Kingsbridge at the head of the estuary. Alternatively, hire a boat or use your tender for the beautiful 3.5 mile trip from Salcombe to Kingsbridge.

Kingsbridge creek is navigable 2½ hours either side of high water as the basin dries out. Follow the channel north of the Saltstone, which is marked by red and white Port Hand marker poles, meandering NNW to Kingsbridge.

As you enter Kingsbridge you will be rewarded with a vibrant market town and access to a number of facilities including supermarkets, quayside leisure centre where showers are available, cinema, tourist information centre and a wide range of shops. Street markets take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays and a local Farmers Market takes place on the Quay on the first Saturday of each month.

Visiting vessels can use the middle section of the main pontoon on the western side of the basin. There are additional berths against lean to piling on the sea wall north west of the Pontoon.

Kingsbridge also offers a quay with a launching slipway adjacent to the large car park. Vessels up to 1 metre draught can be slipped dependent on the tide.

Before proceeding to Kingsbridge please check berthing availability with the Harbour Office (not available Oct-Mar) and note that visitor mooring fees and harbour dues are payable.



Renseignements pratiques

Bienvenue à Salcombe où nous espérons que vous passerez un séjour agréable. Le Personnel du Port sur l'eau et au Bureau du Port à Whitstrand se fera un plaisir de vous fournir tout renseignement désiré.

Mouillages pour les visiteurs

Situés à proximité de la ville, entre l'hôtel Salcombe Harbour et la barge à combustible. Les bouées pour les visiteurs sont généralement colorées en jaune et marquées d'un "V" et de leurs longueurs maximales. Un grand ponton situé dans "The Bag", au nord-ouest de Scoble Point, est à la disposition des visiteurs.

Les plaisanciers sont expressément priés de ne pas ancrer au milieu du chenal, près du traversier ni à proximité du passage des câbles. Mouillages recommandés devant Fishermans Cove, Smalls Cove (évitant la ligne de départ des courses du Yacht Club) et à l'entrée de Frogmore Creek. Vous pouvez demander l'assistance à l'ancrage auprès des bateaux "Harbour Master". Celles-ci sont équipées de Radio V.H.F (Chaîne d'écoute 14). Le Personnel du Port patrouille celui-ci sont entre 7 h et 23h pendant les mois d'été. Une patrouille de sécurité assure les heures restantes (de 23 h à 7 h).

Le ponton normandy pour visiteurs

Cette installation située dans le chenal excavé face à Whitstrand a une profondeur

minimale de 1 mètre, selon les données de la carte marine, et son but est de permettre aux plaisanciers en visite d'embarquer des provisions, de faire le plein d'eau douce et de visiter Salcombe.

Durée maximale d'amarrage en Normandie: 1/2 heure

Pas d'accostage entre 19h et 7h. L'intérieur de ce ponton est réservé aux bateaux de visite. Ces bateaux doivent porter le nom du bateau-mère.

Ordures

Vous trouverez les bennes à recyclage sur le ponton situé face à Normandy et aussi sur le ponton visiteur. Cette benne à ordures est réservée à l'usage exclusif des plaisanciers et il est recommandé de l'utiliser plutôt que de rapporter les ordures à terre.

Douches

Vous trouverez des douches au Whitstrand et Salcombe Yacht Club, Cliff Road, Salcombe. Les codes pour les douches sont imprimés sur votre reçu.

Service de vedettes de taxi

Veillez appeler "Harbour Taxi" sur la Chaîne 12. Voir page 9 de ce guide pour dates et heures de service.

Harbour Facilities

Water	Fresh water is available at Normandy Pontoon and Batson Quay. During June, July and August fresh water is available on the Visitors' Pontoon in the Bag between 1000 & 1100 daily.
Showers	Salcombe Harbour Authority offer two individual cubicles at Whitestrand (code on receipt). Alternatively, Salcombe Yacht Club is happy for visiting yachtsmen to use their showers situated at Cliff House.
Refuse	We request that all Harbour users recycle as much of their waste as possible. Recycling points are located afloat opposite Normandy Pontoon and on the Visitors' Pontoon in the Bag. Afloat bins are only provided for waste generated afloat.
Recycling	We separate our waste for recycling: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Glass bottles & jars ● Paper & cardboard ● Batteries ● Plastic & cans ● Waste Oil ● General waste for landfill
Commercial Refuse	Please contact the Harbour Office if you have commercial waste to dispose of.
International Catering Waste	We are required to enforce the rules on handling International Catering Waste landed in the UK. International Catering Waste (ICW) is any food waste landed from vessels that have operated outside the EU. If since being in your charge the vessel has travelled outside the EU, you need to speak to a member of the harbour staff on arrival and will need to complete a declaration regarding ICW.
Holding Tank Pump Out	Black water pump out facility is provided free of charge at high water alongside Batson Quay, please contact the Harbour Office to arrange.
Lift Out	The Harbour Authority operates a slipway hoist with a lifting capacity of 10 tonnes. For further information contact the Harbour Office.
Scrubbing of Hulls	Boats wishing to scrub their hull should contact the Harbour Office to book a lift. To minimise pollution within the Site of Special Scientific Interest scrubbing can only take place over the grid at Batson.
WiFi	WiFi is available in local cafes, bars and the yacht club.
Fuel	Diesel and Petrol are available from the Fuel Barge, which operates on VHF 6 call sign "Fuel Barge" or 07801798862.
Facilities for Sailors with Disabilities	A hoist is available on Batson and Kingsbridge pontoons and will be made available on request. Although these are the only dedicated facilities we offer for sailors with disabilities, should you have a special requirement, please let us know and we will try our best to accommodate you.

Visitors arriving by sea

Charges

Salcombe's charges for vessels visiting from sea are staggered over the course of the year, based on daily Harbour Dues at £1.00 per metre inc VAT and daily Mooring Fee at £1.00 per metre inc VAT for swinging moorings and isolated pontoons. Vessel lengths are rounded up to the nearest metre.

Alongside/walk-ashore berths (when available) - no rafting	An extra £1 per metre on top of the above charging structure
Weekly rates	Weekly rates on any of the above facilities are ONLY available when paid up front, charged at 5 x the daily rate
Flotillas (a minimum of six boats) (not during the summer school holidays)	Craft attending events such as Owners' Club or Yacht Club races, cruises or rallies will only be facilitated by prior arrangement where payment is made en bloc by the organising body.



Byelaws and Information

The Salcombe Harbour Act of 1954 extends over all the waters of the estuary, which means that, for everyone's benefit, the "Rule of the Road" and the Harbour Byelaws must be observed.

Harbour Byelaws extract

Made by virtue of powers conferred on the Council by virtue and in pursuance of the provisions of the Pier and Harbour Order (Salcombe) Confirmation Act 1954 and of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf.

5. **Anchoring.** Must be in designated areas.
8. **Not to Lie Alongside Others.** Vessels must not double berth on resident moorings unless advised to do so by the Harbour Master.
9. **Obstruction of Others.** Vessels shall not interfere with access to pier, jetty, wharf, landing steps, landing place or hard without the permission of the Harbour Master.
14. **Notification of Collisions, etc.** Any vessel in a collision, stranded, or a danger to other vessels, shall report to HM asap.
18. **Vessels to have names marked on them**
19. **Registration of Vessels.** All vessels must be registered with HM and display a valid registration sticker.
31. **Intoxicated or Disorderly Persons.** No person shall be in a state of intoxication through drink or drugs or shall use any threatening, abusive, indecent, obscene, profane or offensive language or behave in a riotous, disorderly, indecent or offensive manner to the annoyance or hindrance of any other person.
42. Vessels not to be made fast to navigation buoys or marks nor to the seaward side of Whitestrand pontoon and if any contact has been made shall report incident to HM.
43. **Vessels to Navigate with Care** and at a speed which does not cause injury or discomfort.
45. **Speed.** No powered vessel shall exceed eight knots through the water unless HM permission obtained. There is a six knot zone from the Salcombe Harbour Hotel to the Saltstone and in the Kingsbridge Basin.

47. **Persons under 16 Years of Age** may not operate power-driven vessels capable of over 8 knots unless RYA qualified or accompanied by a senior.

48. **Water-skiing, Aquaplaning, Parascending, Personalised Watercraft, Power Boards, Water Bikes and Aqua Scooters etc.** may not operate within the harbour for the purpose of water-skiing, aquaplaning, parascending or any similar waterborne or airborne activity.

Towing donuts and bananas is also prohibited within the harbour with persons on board.

PWC's (Personal Water Craft) are considered vessels and must comply with International Regulations for preventing collision at sea and Harbour Byelaws. PWC's are to proceed at DEAD SLOW speed until clear of harbour limits. Wet bikes are not permitted within the Harbour.

During the months of July and August cruising yachts are requested not to sail inside the harbour.

Windsurfing is prohibited between the Salcombe Harbour Hotel and the Fuel Barge.

Swimming across the harbour fairways and in the middle of the channels is prohibited. Caution must be exercised swimming off the beaches, staying close to the shore. Diving is also prohibited within the harbour limits, unless specific permissions and operations have been sanctioned by the Harbour Master.

Owners of Powerboats who may be lacking in experience are encouraged to gain appropriate qualifications e.g. RYA National Powerboat Certificate or Advanced Powerboat Course.

Insurance

All craft using the Estuary must be covered by insurance for third party liabilities. The current level of third party insurance required is £3,000,000. Failure to maintain this insurance cover will result in the withdrawal of mooring/launching facilities.

Check your wash at all times - navigate with care and consideration, the speed limit is not a target and a safe speed might be much less so as to reduce wake to a minimum in busy areas.





The Harbour Authority runs a seasonal harbour taxi service between Whitestrand pontoon and moored vessels. The area of service extends south to Sunny Cove anchorage, north to the Saltstone anchorage and includes Southpool creek up to the end of the deep water moorings and Batson creek up to the Batson Boat Park (map page 32). It can be contacted directly by calling 'Salcombe Harbour Taxi' on VHF channel 12 or phoning the onboard mobile 07807 643879. Alternatively pop into the harbour office or phone 01548 843791. State clearly yacht name, buoy number/location and number of passengers.

N.B. The harbour staff reserve the right to alter the Schedule of normal hours when exceptional or operational circumstances apply, such as during severe weather.

As a service to the public, the harbour taxi will run to and from East Portlemouth on the hour after the East Portlemouth Ferry has finished, at 1900, 2000, 2100 and 2200 providing bookings have been made in advance for trips from the East Portlemouth side. The service to East Portlemouth is weather dependent and may be cancelled without notice if the weather conditions deteriorate.

Please ensure that you are issued with and retain a ticket. During busy periods, staff will endeavour to collect passengers as soon as possible. Out of season, October through April, pre-booking of your Taxi will reduce waiting time.

Harbour Dues & Resident facilities



Harbour Dues

Harbour Dues are levied to enable the Harbour Authority to fulfil its statutory duties. This includes the conservancy of the harbour, maintenance dredging, regular hydrographical surveys, navigation marks and beacons, and the enforcement of harbour byelaws etc. It also includes the fulfilment of our responsibilities within the Port Marine Safety Code including the training of staff, oil spill response and the port waste management plan.

All boats residing on annual facilities are required to pay annual Harbour dues based on boat length and engine horsepower. This is also applicable to all vessels launching from land into the harbour including paddleboards, kayaks and personal water craft (jet ski etc). A daily payment is available for short stays. Please ensure your Harbour Dues sticker is prominently displayed and not obscured whilst your boat is not in use. In purchasing your Harbour Dues you are confirming you hold appropriate third party insurance to £3,000,000 to cover the use of your vessel and mooring.



Resident moorings

Salcombe Harbour Authority manages the majority of mooring facilities in the harbour. As a municipal port and part of South Hams District Council (SHDC) we lease the fundus/seabed from the Duchy of Cornwall and manage the allocation of all mooring facilities, apart from those leased or owned directly by private boatyards/individuals.

Those who pay Council Tax to SHDC are welcome to join our waiting lists which are subdivided into:

- Foreshore pontoons; Batson, Victoria Quay and Kingsbridge
- Foreshore moorings; various swinging mooring locations
- Deep water moorings/pontoons; Off town, Bag and Southpool
- Other shore side tender storage; various Boatpark spaces or dinghy racks

Provided that you remain a SHDC Council Tax payer, allocations will only occur where an applicant reaches the top of a particular waiting list (which may take many years) and has a suitable boat that can be accommodated on such available facility. Facilities are renewed annually and require retention the year beforehand, should your facility be relinquished you will no longer hold a position on the waiting list and must reapply.

Tide Tables for Salcombe Harbour and Kingsbridge Estuary are printed in this publication and obtainable from local chandlers and stationers.

These are all considerably affected by wind conditions and barometric pressure.

Batson Creek Boat Park + Slipway

There is a car, boat and trailer park off Gould Road in Batson Creek, with an attendant on duty during the season. Car/Boat Park spaces can be booked in advance on a weekly basis, sat-sat, or arranged on a daily basis with the attendant upon arrival - 01548 843791, email: b.boatpark@southhams.gov.uk

The Batson Boat Park Slipway also provides launching at almost all states of the tide for trailable small craft, unlike the other drying slipways around the harbour. Security cameras monitor the whole boat park area and have been enhanced with new infrared capability and fast retrieve hard drives. The trailer park is locked overnight to prevent unregulated access.

Slipway Guidelines

Slipways can be extremely dangerous areas, please follow these guidelines to reduce risks and improve everyone's safety.

- PLEASE be considerate to other slipway users at all times. Safety is paramount.
- Use the one-way system within the boatpark to reduce congestion.
- **When towing trailers, ensure that the safety chain or loop is connected at all times.**
- A maximum of 10 minutes is permitted while using the slipway. If you require assistance please see the attendant.
- Inflation of dinghies is not permitted on the slipway. An inflation area has been provided for this purpose and a pump is available - see boat park attendant.
- Use of the slipway is exclusively for the launch and retrieval of vessels. Please prepare your craft in the designated area.
- Personnel not involved directly in launching and recovering vessels should keep clear of the slipway. A pedestrian accessway and bridge to the Batson Slipway pontoon should be used to access afloat craft without traversing the slipway.
- Berthing on Batson Slipway pontoon is restricted to loading and unloading only, with crew in attendance, overnighting berthing is prohibited.

Beaches



East Portsmouth side - Fishermans, Smalls, Mill Bay & Sunny Cove



The Beaches of East Portsmouth are privately owned and use of the beaches is at the discretion of the owners.

For the benefit of all, the owners request:

1. ABSOLUTELY NO barbecues, fires or beach parties
2. ABSOLUTELY NO camping, day or overnight
3. No undue noise or loud music
4. Dogs should be kept under strict control at all times. Dogs on Mill Bay Beach to be on leads between 10am and 5pm May to September
5. All rubbish should be taken away
6. No outboards or road trailers to be left on the beach at any time
7. Night fishing seaward of Mill Bay only
8. No mooring of any boats on the foreshore
9. No driving or parking of any motor vehicles

Mill Bay Boat Parking

Sailing dinghies may be parked on the beach with permission, please refer to beach notices as boat parking is prohibited under the houses. Permits are issued on a weekly basis (with a limit of four weeks per year) and must be CLEARLY displayed on the boats at all times, even when covered. There is a recommended donation of £10 per week per boat, the surplus of which will go to local charities. Boats left on the beach beyond their permit will be removed at the boat owners' expense.

Boat owners may obtain their permits from the Venus Café, at the ferry steps, East Portsmouth - 01548 843558. Please note payment for permits can be CASH only. Those racing in the Merlin Rocket, Yacht Club or Town Regattas may obtain their permit with their regatta application.

Salcombe Lifeboats

Salcombe has had a Lifeboat Station for 153 years. The current Station is operated by a team of 41 local men and women, the Coxswain / Mechanic being a full-time employee of the RNLI, the remaining 40 are all volunteers. Our mission is to reach any casualty, in any sea/weather conditions, within 10 miles of the lifeboat station, within 30 minutes of first being alerted. The station operates two boats, the 25-knot all-weather lifeboat (ALB) The Baltic Exchange III capable of operating in any sea/weather and the 35 knots Atlantic 85 inshore lifeboat (ILB) Gladys Hilda Mustoe for work closer to the shore.

Search & Rescue Incidents

During the first 10 months of 2022 the Salcombe lifeboats have launched on 48 occasions, to a mixture of incidents involving yachts, fishing boats, commercial vessels, kayakers, swimmers, divers etc.

2021 statistics show the RNLI nationwide launched on 8,868 occasions and aided 12,903 people with 296 lives saved. The Southwest of England saw 1,387 launches, aided 1,350 people with 36 lives saved.

2022 in Salcombe has seen something of a return to normality following the Pandemic years; with both lifeboats launching to sea on a regular basis. Over the past 153 years, the Lifeboat has remained a core

part of what makes Salcombe special, and its activities are supported by a dedicated team of shore helpers, launching officers, fundraisers, and other voluntary supporters.

Fundraising

The RNLI is a registered charity and relies on voluntary contributions from the public, it receives no Government funding. Our Fundraising Crew works tirelessly to organize and run events to support our Sea Going Crew. If you would like to become a part of the Fundraising Crew please contact us, via any of the addresses listed below or through our shop in Union Street.

Welcome to Salcombe Harbour - Kingsbridge Estuary ...

... a rich Local Nature Reserve

As an estuary, the Salcombe-Kingsbridge Estuary is unusually rich - with a relatively small water catchment area and without a river, it is very dominated by the tidal waters from the coast. This results in some unusually sheltered marine conditions that support a richer diversity of habitats and marine life than most.

Rich seagrass jungles, kelp forests, coral and sponge gardens can all be found here and don't be too surprised to see grey seals, kingfishers and other coastal characters - even the occasional glimpse of an otter or visiting dolphin!

Don't overlook the saltmarshes and mudflats though, their productivity may match tropical rainforests but the amount of carbon they lock away for geological timescales beats them hands down! We very probably need them, far more than they need us.

We need your help though, not just to conserve the estuary but to nurture the significant health and wellbeing benefits that it serves us - nothing too radical, just adopt the common sense respect and care outlined over these next few pages.

The estuary is designated as a marine Site of Special Scientific Interest and Local Nature Reserve - where its understanding & conservation, sustainable use & enjoyment are positively encouraged. The best way to enjoy the estuary and some of its wildlife is to learn more about it, discovering the area quietly from the water or around its shores - maybe join an event with a local operator. You can find out more from one of our local Information Centres or visit the South Devon AONB website for many free self-guided trails, events & guides about this special area.

A safety-net of byelaws help protect the estuary and wildlife and to keep it special; dogs should be under close control to minimise disturbance, there are restrictions on open fires and some bait collection activities. The local conservation management of the estuary is overseen by the South Devon AONB Estuaries Partnership.



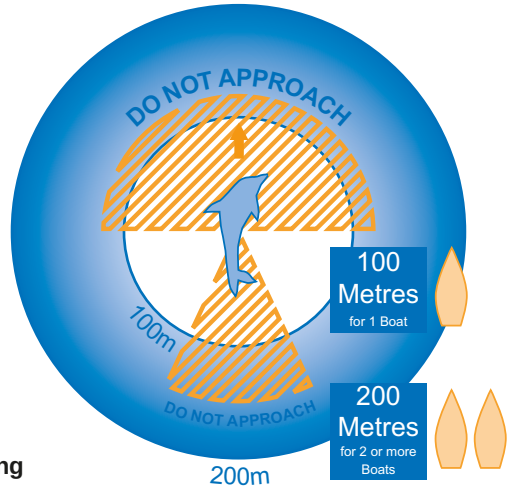

Marine Animals Code of Conduct

For some animals, the confined shallows of our estuary place greater demands on their ability to navigate and extra allowances must be made for them.

- **Always let them decide what happens**
- **Keep your distance** never closer than **100m** where possible
- **Never drive head-on to, or move between, scatter or separate groups of animals.** If unsure, stop and put the engine in neutral
- **Take special care with mothers and young**
- **Avoid repeated changes in direction or speed - maintain a slow 'no wake' speed -** if animals keep heading away or your activity is distressing them, slowly leave
- **Never** dispose of any rubbish, litter or contaminants at sea.

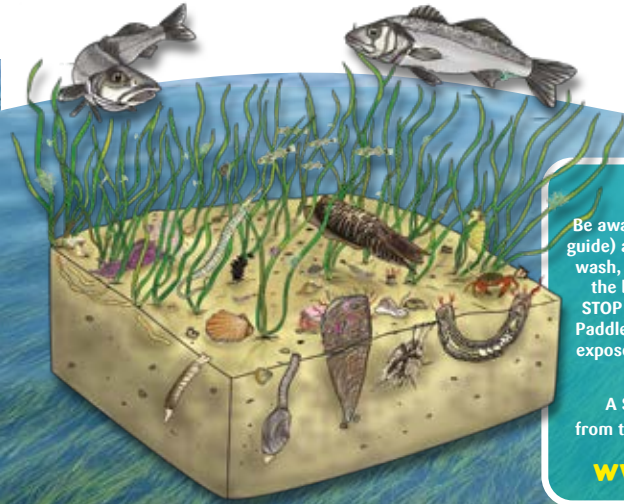
Many marine animals are declining and your active co-operation in conserving them is expected by law - most are protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act (as amended). It is an offence to deliberately or recklessly disturb, harass or endanger them.

Salcombe's Seagrass Jungles!



Playing your part

Be aware of where the seagrass grows (see chart within this guide) and try to avoid these areas - avoid excessive propeller wash, anchoring, allowing your boat to ground or drag over the beds. If you do find yourself within seagrass, simply STOP - lift your engine clear & paddle out to deeper water. Paddlers should take care to avoid dragging their craft over exposed seagrass and 'punting' against the seabed or harsh paddling until clear of the beds.

- Some of the UK's richest seagrass communities are found within Salcombe Harbour
- Seagrasses help reduce the effects of global warming 35x more efficiently than rainforests
- They provide vital food and shelter for a diverse community of sea life and are an important nursery habitat for 3 out of 4 commercial fisheries species
- Seagrasses are flowering plants, with leaves and roots - not seaweeds at all
- Seagrasses benefit us all but are fragile and need our care ... globally, they are one of our fastest disappearing marine communities



Suffering a wasting disease, thought to be pollution related, the extent of seagrass in the UK is just 10% of that pre 1930's. Seagrass meadows are very vulnerable to boats anchoring and propeller scour, inappropriate moorings, dredging and destructive fishing methods – all leading to further seagrass loss and habitat fragmentation.

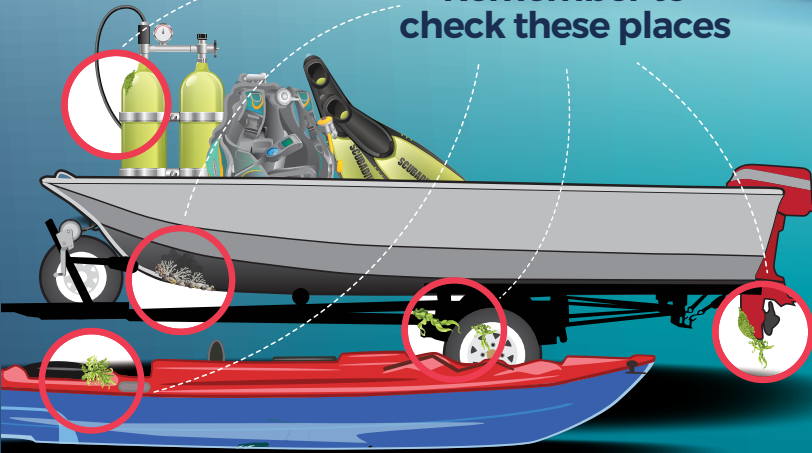
STOP THE SPREAD

Invasive plants and animals can harm the marine environment and wildlife, damage boats, and foul hulls, pontoons, and other hard surfaces. They can be small and hard to spot so are easily spread on damp equipment and clothing.

Protect the marine environment and sport you enjoy by keeping your kit free of invasive plants and animals.



Remember to check these places

CHECK

Check boats, equipment and clothing after leaving the water for fouling or plant material. Remove anything you find and put it in the bin. Reapply anti-fouling annually.

CLEAN

Clean everything thoroughly with freshwater as soon as you can, paying attention to ropes, bilges, trailers, and areas that are damp and hard to access. Wash your anchor and chain before leaving an anchorage.

DRY

Dry - drain water from every part of your trailer and boat, including the bilge, before leaving the site. Dry everything for as long as you can before using elsewhere.

Jellyfish ID Guide

While some jellyfish are harmless or have a very mild sting, others have a painful and even dangerous sting. **MCS would therefore recommend that, for your own safety, you do not touch jellyfish.**



Moon jellyfish
Mild sting.
Up to 40cm in diameter. Transparent, umbrella-shaped bell edged with short hair-like tentacles. Recognised by the four distinct pale purple gonad rings in the bell. Manubrium (mouth and arms, underside and centre of bell) bears 4 short, frilled arms.



Compass jellyfish
This jellyfish stings.
Typically up to 30cm. Colour variable, but usually has pale umbrella-shaped bell with diagnostic brownish V-shaped markings, 32 marginal lobes and 24 long, thin tentacles, four long, thick, frilled arms hang from the manubrium.



Lion's mane jellyfish
This jellyfish stings.
Large, usually 50cm but can reach 2m in diameter. Large reddish brown, umbrella-shaped bell with a mass of long, thin hair-like tentacles as well as short, thick, frilled and folded arms.



Blue jellyfish
Mild sting.
Up to 30cm, similar shape to *C. capillata* but smaller with a blue bell through which radial lines can be seen.



Barrel jellyfish
Mild sting.
Up to 1m in diameter. Robust with a spherical, solid rubbery bell, which can be white or pale pink, blue or yellow and fringed with purple markings. The bell lacks tentacles but eight thick, frilled arms hang from the manubrium.



Mauve stinger
This jellyfish stings.
Up to 10cm. Has a deep bell with pink or mauve warts, 16 marginal lobes and eight marginal, hair-like tentacles. Manubrium bears four longer frilled arms with tiny pink spots.



By-the-wind-sailor
Generally harmless.
Not a jellyfish but a floating, solitary hydranth. Up to 10cm long and blue-purple in colour. Upright sail and chitinous float are diagnostic, with a mass of small tentacles surrounding the mouth on the underside. Occurs in vast swarms.



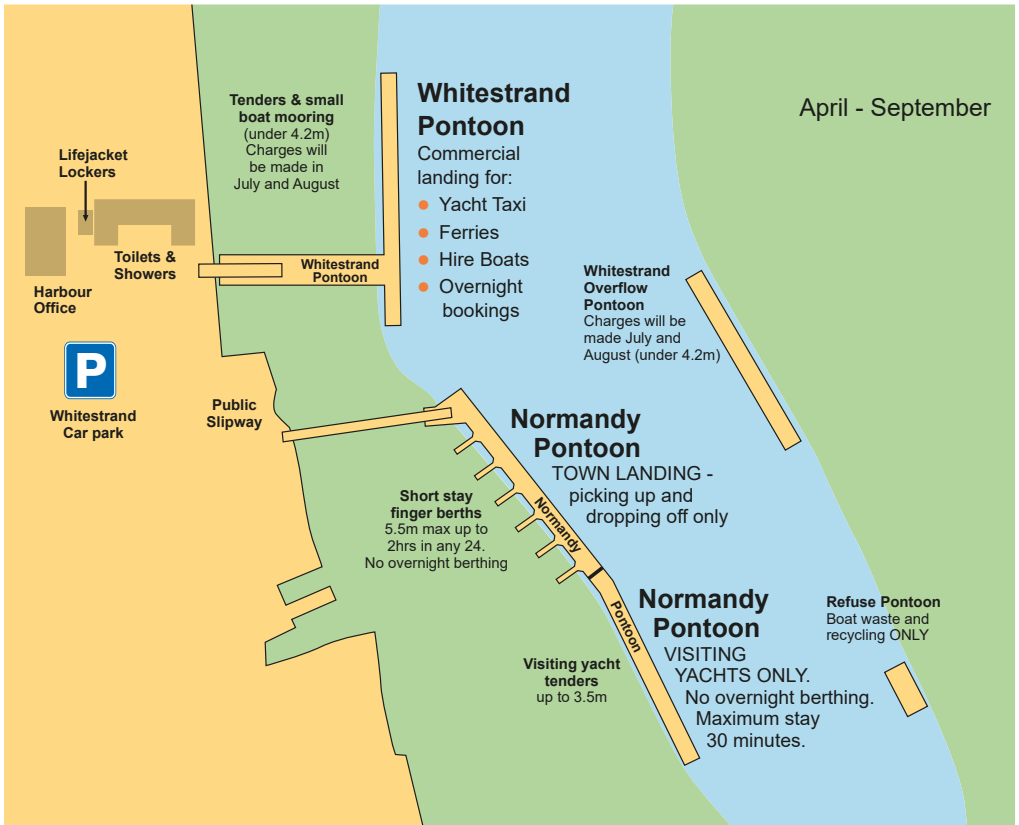
Portuguese man-of-war
This animal stings.
Not a jellyfish, but a floating colony of hydrozoans. The oval-shaped, transparent float with crest is characteristic. Blue-purple in colour, with many hanging 'fishing polyps' below that may be tens of metres long. Extremely dangerous to humans due to their powerful sting. Rare in the UK but if found in numbers should be reported to the local authorities.
